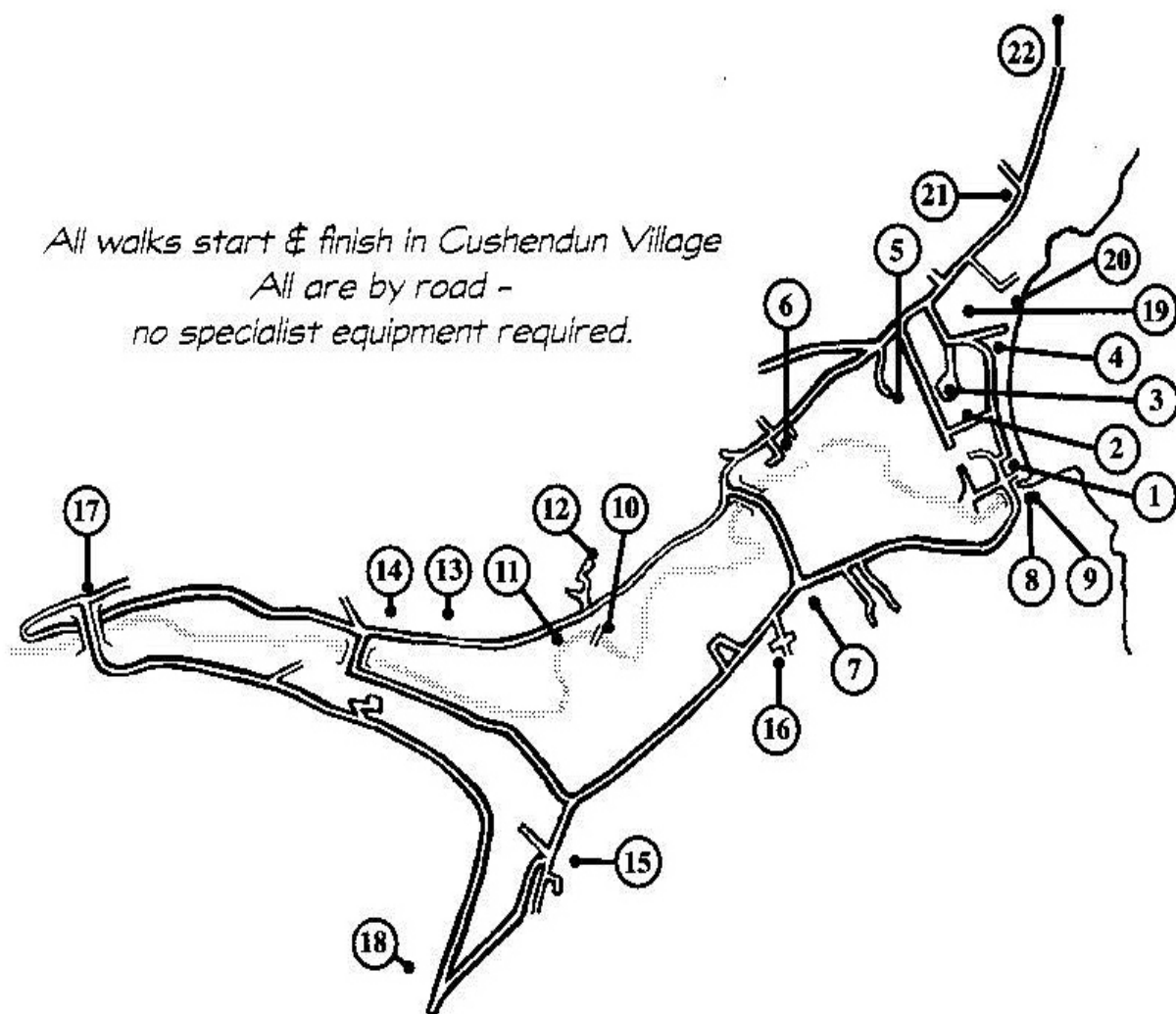

# SMALL RING

2 miles

Numbers 1 to 9



## 1. Cushendun Village :

Designed by Clough William Ellis in 1912 at the request of Lord Cushendun's wife Maud, after whom the Maud Cottages are named.



## 2. Church of Ireland :

Built in 1838 by Michael Harrison, who at the time was residing in Glenmona.



## 3. Glenmona :

Rebuilt in 1923 by Lord Cushendun to the design of Clough William Ellis. Now a day centre for the elderly.

## 4. Strand House :

Originally the Parochial House built by the Whites in 1855.

## 5. Glendun Lodge :

A bathing lodge in the early 1800's. Occupied for many years by Miss Ada McNeill, a close friend of Roger Casement.

## 6. Carey's Mill :

In 1847 it was built as a corn mill by the Whites who were the landlords of the area.

## 7. Knocknacarry :

Once a thriving village with a smithy, post office, petrol pump, shoemaker, police barracks, two shops and a pub.



## 8. Cave House :

Built by Nicholas Crommelin whose daughter married John Masfield. Now owned by the Mercy Order.

## 9. Cushendun Hotel :

Originally a flax mill and rope works built by Crommelin in 1864. Converted to a hotel around 1920 by Mrs McBride.

## 10. Chapel :

Rebuilt on an ancient site in 1804  
and enlarged in 1865.



## 11. Fulldiew Stone :

Tells story about a broken hearted girl whose fiancée died at sea.

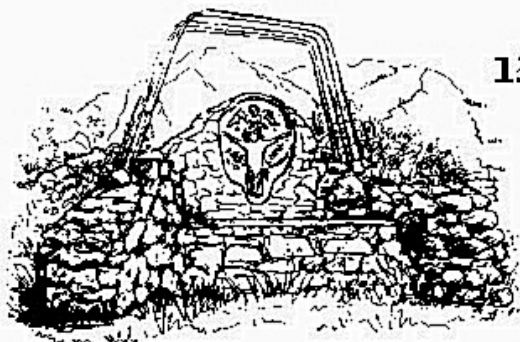
## 12. Gloonan Stone :

A kneeling stone said to have the imprint of St Patrick's knee. It's water is reputed to cure warts.



## 13. Mass Rock :

Not a penal site. Originally used for the celebration of Mass before the church was built. An annual procession has been taking place for over 100 years.



## 14. Craigagh Woods :

Planted around 1840 by the Whites. Booley House and Souterrain can be found here.

## 15. Dromore Cottage :

Francis Turnley built this as a school around 1840.

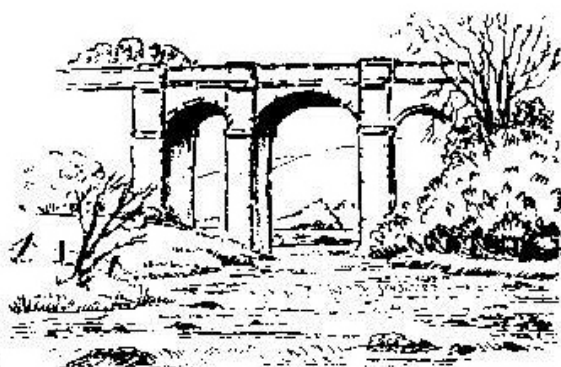
## 16. Knocknacarry School :

Opened in 1850. Replaced in 1979 by St Claran's

## BY GLENDUN VIADUCT

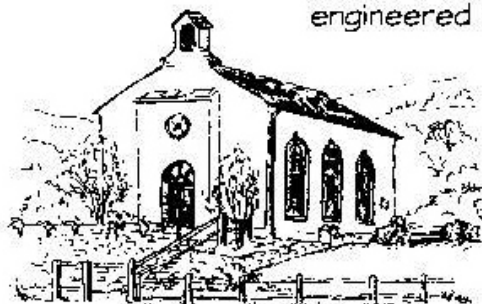
Numbers 1 to 6, 10 to 14,

### 17. Viaduct :

Built in 1839 by Charles Lanyon to carry the famous Coast Road engineered by William Bald.



### 18. Mullarts :

An old Presbyterian Church built around 1855. Finally closed in 1898 and now converted into holiday apartments.

## Diversión to Torr

Numbers 1 to 4, 19 to 22

### 19. Carra Castle :

Once a McDonnell stronghold. Shane O'Neill was murdered here in 1567.



### 20. Rockport :

Built by Lord O'Neill in 1815. Later used by Nicholas Crommelin and then by the poet, Maura O'Neill. Now the property of the National Trust.

### 21. Shane's Cairn :

Site of an ancient burial ground. The cairn was built in 1908 in memory of Shane O'Neill who is buried here.



### 22. The Caiseal :

Thought to have been a Celtic stronghold.
